Quilter Profile Naomi

Gakunga

KENYAN QUILTER
AND FIBRE ARTIST

You may be surprised at the title and wonder how you have missed Naomi at Kenya Quilt Guild meetings. The fact is that, although her roots are in Kenya, Naomi, a fibre artist of international repute, is based in San Antonio, California. I first came across her work in 2009 in the April/May issue of Quilting Arts magazine (see below), where she had written an article on her art called "Strings of Love". She tells how she has been inspired by the basket weaving techniques practiced by the Kikuyu women with whom she grew were available, mainly straws up. The kiondos, woven from and shrubs known as migiyo in hand twisted sisal, gave Naomi the Kikuyu language." In her her first introduction to the article she elaborates on this possibilities of fibre art.

In her blog Naomi says "I have worked with strings, ropes, cords, wire, and recycled materials ever since I was a child growing up among the Kikuyu people of Kenya. My grandmother and her friends were basket weavers.

From them I learned how to be creative using any materials that

were available, mainly straws and shrubs known as migiyo in the Kikuyu language." In her article she elaborates on this saying "I have taken the string from the traditional Kikuyu context and transformed it into contemporary quilt art. My challenge has been to deconstruct the three-dimensional kiondo and reconstruct it into two dimensional quilt art. the kiondo." Dawn (left) and Dusk (right) are shown below.







"The threads, strings and cords are no longer hidden in the fabric and utility of the kiondo." Naomi first paints her fabrics using various techniques — brushwork, stenciling and silk screen printing. She may use leaves, twigs and rocks to create a textured surface. Next she creates more texture with machine stitching and layers of cotton yarns. Sometimes she cuts her fabric and reconstructs it. She may add knitted or crocheted strips to the surface.

She says "All of the cutting and stitching allows the strings and the knitted and crocheted swatches to merge with the stitched cotton fabric." Sunset (on the next page) illustrates these techniques and if you look closely at the picture on the right (next page) you can see the detail of knitted or crocheted strips.






Naomi's years in colourful San Antonio, with its Mexican and Spanish heritage have had considerable influence on her work. Time spent at El Mercado (the market square) watching dancing, inspired the quilt on the right below, and Mariachi, on the left below, which was selected for an exhibition of "Fibre Art for the Human Form" in Minneapolis was also inspired by Folklorico dancing in San Antonio.









One of Naomi's pieces "Kamuingi Koyaga Ndiri" - "Together, We Can| is shown below extreme left. Naomi says "This quilt depicts images of five women carrying a heavy load on their heads. Their mental and physical strength and resiliency are symbolized by their heads made of metal. The heavy weight of their load is symbolized by the basket made of steel. The hopes and success of this heavy lifting is symbolized by the fruits (of their labor) sprouting from the basket.

It takes courage and strength to put a heavy load on the head and still walk tall."

Above lower right is "Voices of Africa" which was exhibited in April this year at the Quilt Nihon 11th Biennial Exhibition in the Tokyo Metropolitan Museum. Naomi will also be exhibiting in the Rio Patchwork Design: Contemporary Quilt Show in June and at the 18th European Quilt Festival at St Marie-aux-Mines-in France.

We in the Kenya Quilt Guild wish Naomi the best of luck in her blossoming career and we hope that she will visit her homeland in the not too far distant future and that we will have the opportunity to meet her and see more of her work.


