10 SEWING HABITS TO BREAK

Here's a list of 10 bad sewing habits to break out of.

- Do you
 Pre Wash
 your fabrics?
- Not cleaning your machine. Basic machine
 maintenance is beyond important and we suggest
 starting here, by getting your most important
 tool in tip-top shape. A simple clean out of the
 bobbin area can help keep those fabric dust
 bunnies from multiplying like mad.
- Not replacing your needle. This small task will help prevent stitches from skipping, keep your seams tight, and your machine running smoothly.
- Not cleaning your <u>iron</u>. To avoid any unwanted markings left on your fabric, it is important to keep your <u>iron</u> clean. So, if you notice any crude on the bottom of the pressing plate, now is the time to clean it. Here is a quick video to show you just how easy it is to get your iron clean!
- Not changing your rotary blade. Project work starts on the cutting table and if you have never changed a rotary blade before, trust me... NOW is the time! It does not have to be scary. Here is a quick guide to swapping out your rotary blade.
- Not nesting your seams. This one particularly applies to quilters. Nesting seams are a great way to keep your seam allowance flat in quilt blocks. This is a common term in quilting and refers to the layering of seam allowance in the opposite direction to reduce bulk. See <a href="https://example.com/howance-nest-your-seams-nest-your-se

- Not using the right needle. Never has had the right tool for the job been more important than with sewing machine needles. Specialty needles can allow your machine to glide through the fabric without tearing or nicking (ballpoint for knits), produce crisp and clean thick stitches (topstitching/denim), and create two stitch lines in one pass (twin needle).
- Not pre-washing your fabric. I know, this is a controversial topic, but we want to encourage you not to skip this vital step.
- Sewing over pins. From broken needles and bend pins to messing with the timing of your machine and risking eye injuries, sewing over pins is a danger zone.
- Not understanding pattern markings. Most patterns have standardized markings, which makes it easier and faster to sew with them over time once you have practiced with a few of them. Let's take a look at the magic decoding key.
- Using fabric scissors for paper. Using fabric scissors to cut paper will gradually remove the sharp edge of the scissors making them dull for cutting and they might even damage your fabric. Make sure to have one pair of very nice and sharp scissors only for fabric and another pair for cutting your patterns.

All the best as you break our bad sewing habits!

The Haberdashery Department was located on the 5th floor, so we found our way to the lift. Posted on the lift doors was very interesting information. This was when we discovered that a special 150th Patchwork celebration was being held: A double treat. So, we went up to the 5th Floor first. The walls were lined with bolts of Liberty Tana Lawn Fabrics: A feast for one's eyes. I felt like Alice in Wonderland: The colors, the designs, the quality, the prices! This was going to be a 'look', 'don't touch', 'maybe buy later' visit.

To celebrate the 150th anniversary Liberty wished to bring history to life. Over the course of three months, their network of artisans, makers, designers and visionaries, collaborated from across the globe to create a new, collective artwork which resulted in the supersized patchwork house. This house comprised of almost 1000 individual pieces.

Not every patchwork block could be incorporated into the house, so underneath the main exhibition were more squares stored in flip books.







Sewing Rooms Bunty's Studio

What better than the opportunity to design your whole quilting studio from scratch. Bunty was fortunate to have the space to do exactly that.



Started the studio first with the design wall as the focal point. Once in place, Bunty designed the storage space on the widest side of the room from old cupboards and metal shelves given by a friend. The perfect shelving space is filled with custom made boxes allocated to organise fabrics and threads by brand and type plus files for all the patterns and reading material. The height of each shelf can be adjusted to fit fabrics either in bolts or fat quarter bundles.

The Bernina face the window for a beautiful view of Nairobi and light. The room has a perfect space for everything. His experience in high end furniture business helped in designing each purpose-built storage shelf according to the size of the machine or tools owned or planning to acquire.

The entire spacious studio is very well thought out and a brilliant work of art which is ideal to work on quilting projects and conduct workshops to accommodate many students.





Finished block size 12"x 12"


Cutting Instructions:

Background Fabric:

- 3 squares 4 ½" x 4 ½"
- 3 squares 5" x 5"

Contrast Fabric:

• 3 squares 5"x 5"

No. 1- 12pcs 2 3/8" X 2 3/8"



SAMPLER BLOCK 2

Last month we started with a basic 9 patch block with simple square units. This month we will look at **Half-square triangle (HST) units.**

Half-square triangle (HST) units are one of the most versatile and widely used elements in patchwork quilting. Here are the benefits of making and using HST units:

1. Versatility in Design

- HSTs can be arranged in countless layouts—chevrons, pinwheels, diamonds, flying geese, zigzags, and more.
- They allow you to create geometric patterns with movement and contrast, often with just two fabrics.

2. Efficient Use of Fabric

- HSTs make excellent use of scraps and precuts, such as charm squares and layer cakes.
- Minimal fabric waste when using the two-at-a-time or four-at-a-time methods.

3. Skill Building

- Great practicing accurate cutting, sewing, trimming, and pressing.
- Reinforces consistent 1/4" seam allowance and alignment skills—essential for all piecing.

4. Precision with Trimming

• HSTs are usually oversized and then trimmed, which helps quilters produce perfectly square, crisp blocks.

5. Compatibility with Other Blocks

• HSTs easily combine with four-patch, nine-patch, flying geese, and other units for complex blocks (e.g., Ohio Star, Bear Paw, Churn Dash).

6. Strong Visual Impact

• The diagonal seam creates a natural contrast line, perfect for highlighting light/dark colour play or creating dramatic effects.

7. Encourages Creativity

- A simple HST can be rotated or combined in new ways to design original quilt blocks or entire layouts.
- Ideal for All Levels
- Beginner-friendly: Simple to make and repeat.
- Advanced quilters: Can explore more intricate HST-based designs like feathered stars or interlocking patterns.

HOW TO MAKE HALF-SQUARE TRIANGLE (HST) UNITS:

Two-at-a-Time HSTs

This is the most common and beginnerfriendly method for making half-square triangle units.

Step-by-Step Instructions:

1. **Cut Fabric Squares**Cut two squares of equal size.


Materials Needed:

- Two fabric squares (one light, one dark)
- · Rotary cutter and cutting mat
- Quilting ruler
- Pencil or fabric marking tool
- Sewing machine with a 1/4" foot
- Iron and pressing surface

Formula:

Finished HST size + 7/8" = Square size to cut.

Tip: Add 1" instead to allow trimming for accuracy.



2. Mark Diagonal Line

• On the wrong side of the lighter square, use a pencil/chalk/frixion pen to draw a diagonal line from corner to corner.



3. Layer Squares


Place the light and dark fabric squares right sides together, with the marked line on top.


4. Sew 1/4" Seams

Sew a line 1/4" away from both sides of the marked diagonal line.

5. Cut Apart

Use a rotary cutter and ruler to cut directly along the marked line. This creates two triangle units.





6. Press the Units

Open each unit and press the seam toward the darker fabric, or press seams open for a flatter finish.




7. Trim to Size

Use a square ruler with a 45° line to trim each unit to the correct size.

Tip: Specialty trimming rulers like Bloc-Loc can make trimming faster and more precise.





Optional:

Other HST Methods

- Four-at-a-Time: Great for bulk sewing; no marked lines needed.
- Magic 8 Method: Makes 8 HSTs at once; ideal for larger projects.
- Strip Piecing: For advanced users looking for speed.
