LOOK WHAT I FOUND!

I was in the process of sorting out the pile of papers on my desk and my filing trays when I came upon a sheet of USA postal stamps from the early 2000's. Oops this tells you how long it had been since I sorted my filing trays.

One of the sheets was entitled 'American Treasures' Quilts of Gee's Bend. I had purchased these stamps ages ago when it cost only 39 cents to post a letter. It now cost 78 cents.

The "American Treasures: Gee's Bend Quilts" is a set of commemorative stamps that were released by the U.S. Postal Service in 2006 and featured ten quilt designs created by African American women from Gee's Bend, Alabama.

These quilts are specifically known for their bold patterns, unexpected colour combinations, and use of recycled materials. The stamps also highlight the ingenuity of the Gee's Bend quilters, who often incorporated old clothing, work clothes and other repurposed materials into their quilts.

They are celebrated as important works of American folk art.

The specific quilt patterns featured on the stamps include:

- Housetop
- Medallion
- Log Cabin
- Chinese Coins
- Nine Patch
- Bars and Columns
- Roman Stripes
- Pig in a Pen
- Blocks and Strips
- Medallion and Checkered Centre

U.S. Postal Service Art director, Derry Noyes, turned famous artwork into stamps. She chose photographs of ten quilts created between circa 1940 and 2001, by women in Gee's Bend.

I chatted with her about her newfound love for quilting, and she said "oh, have you seen the quilt display our guild has in the library next door? We just put it up yesterday!" I dashed over and discovered a peaceful reading room filled with sun and quilts that members living on this tiny island had created.











LIBERTY OF LONDON

What is the history of Tana Lawn Cotton?

Since the late 1890s Liberty has been experimenting with cotton lawn, a smooth plain weave prized for its ultra-soft and durable qualities. In the early 1930s, Liberty's then-Cotton Buyer William Hayes Dorell helped to establish a new Liberty signature, Tana Lawn cotton — and a brand legend was born. The ground-breaking product was named after Lake Tana in Ethiopia, where its unique long-staple cotton fibres originated. Back in the UK the silk-like threads were spun into lustrous form, printed with colourful ink, and turned into a material that would change the textile industry forever.



Today, every bolt of Tana is the product of a bespoke production process: designed by the in-house studio artists, then printed at Liberty's own Italian mill, close to Lake Como. Skilled technicians oversee the production of many hundreds of different designs, using a combination of traditional screen printing and cutting-edge digital printing techniques. The cotton fibre used in Tana is grown in India, Egypt and US.

Tana is made from specially selected ultra-fine long staple cotton, woven from 70 and 100 ply yarns and subjected to a lengthy series of preparations to ensure its distinctive qualities of handle, lustre and stability. It has a thread count of 240.


Liberty has more than 40,000 designs in its library of prints - some of them dating back to the 1700s, You can read more about them below.



SAMPLER BLOCK 3 FOR BEGINNERS

This month's sampler block introduces ¼ square triangles. (QST)



Mosaic PW Block

This block is made up of 5 squares and 4 QST set in a 3X3 grid Cutting Instructions:


Fabric A 4 ½"x 4 ½"5 Pieces

Fabric B 5 ½"x 5 ½"4 Pieces

Fabric C 5 ½"x 5 ½"4 **Pieces**

The measurements for Fabric B and C are with little wiggle room added.

BLOCK FOR INTERMEDIATE TO ADVANCE QUILTERS



Belt Buckle block 12"x 12"

This block isn't a nine patch, it follows 2x2 grid.

The block consists of 2 squares, 10 HST's of different fabric combinations, 4 QST's Cutting Instructions: -

Fabric 1: 3 ½"x 3 ½" 2 Pcs

4"x 4" 1 pc

Fabric 2: 4"x 4" 4pcs

4 ½"x 4 ½"2pcs

Fabric 3: 4 ½"x 4 ½"2pcs

Fabric 4: 4"x 4" 3 pcs


4 ½"x 4 ½"2pcs

Fabric 5:4"x 4" 2pcs

The pieces for HST's and QST's are oversized, giving room wiggle.

QUARTER SQUARE TRIANGLE (QST) 2

We have covered two of the simplest units in patchwork which are found in almost all quilt blocks i.e. a square and ½ square triangles (HST)

This month the attention is on ¼ square triangles (QST)

What is a Quarter Square Triangle (QST)?

A Quarter-Square Triangle is a square made from four equal rightangled triangles, with the diagonal seam lines forming an "X" across the block. They are great for adding movement and complexity to quilts.

The QST like the HST, the starting units are squares of fabric. The formula for cutting the starting squares for QST is Finished block size $+ 1 \frac{1}{4}$ " = cut size starting squares

Example: For a **4" finished QST**, cut squares 5 ½" (if your quarter inch seam is perfect). I like to add a little extra giving some <u>wiggle room</u>, <u>cutting 5 ½" squares</u> and trimming down to size after stitching.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. Cut the fabric

- 1. Cut two squares (for two colours) to the calculated size.
 - Example: For a 4" finished block, cut two 5¼" squares, one of each colour.

2. Make Half-Square Triangles (HSTs) first


- 1. Place your two squares right sides together.
- 2. Draw a diagonal line from corner to corner on the lighter fabric.
- 3. Sew 1/4" seam on each side of the drawn line.
- 4. Cut apart on the drawn line, giving two HSTs.

3. Make the QST units

- 1. Press the seams toward the darker fabric.
- 2. Place the two HST units **right sides together**, nesting seams so the colours are opposite each other.




3. Draw another diagonal line **perpendicular** to the seam you've already sewn.



- 4. Sew 1/4" on each side of this new line.
- 5. Cut apart on the drawn line.
 This gives **two identical QST blocks**

4. Press & trim

1. Press seams either to one side or open (open reduces bulk at the centre).



2. Trim each QST to the unfinished size:

Finished block size + ½"

(example: 4" finished → trim to 4 ½").




Tips for Accuracy

- 1. Starch your fabric before cutting for less stretching.
- 2. Always cut your starting squares a bit larger if you want to trim for precision.
- 3. When trimming, align the 45° diagonal line on your ruler with one seam for accuracy.

In Stitches, previously The Woman Shop, stocks a wide variety of general haberdashery items, fabrics, knitting yarn, embroidery threads and much more.

The owner, Mr. Sagar Shah has undertaken to provide a terrific selection of good quality cotton fabrics, both printed and plain. The assortment of yarn is great as are the embroidery threads and sewing threads.



The accessory boards house diverse selection of scissors, sewing notions, embroidery tools, quilting tools/mats, knitting needles and crochet hooks.











There is a varied selection of Bernina sewing machines on display, ranging from simple editions to more advanced models. In Stitches is a certified Bernina representative and they undertake machine maintenance.





The staff are professional and keen to assist their customers.

Opening hours are very favourable as their doors are open from 10.00 a.m. until 7.00 p.m. from Monday to Saturday. On Sunday they are open from 11.00 a.m. until 5.00 p.m.

Scheduled classes are also held. More information is available from the shop.

In Stitches also provides the quilting package for the Guild's monthly meeting.
